5. Iowa Tree Planting Grant Program

Commission approval is requested for spending for the Iowa Tree Planting Grant program

Grant Terms

Amount: Not to exceed \$ 710,000.00

Dates: January 1, 2025 to November 30, 2026

Funding Source(s): Federal Funds (Forest Service) 100%; Inflation Reduction Act

Contract Purpose: The DNR's purpose is to sub-grant money from the USDA Forest Service to disadvantaged communities for tree planting projects on public property. The grant money can be used over a two-year period.

The DNR Forestry Section manages the Urban Forest program, aimed at working with communities and counties to better their managed tree resources through pass through grant funding. USDA Forest Service is an agency that works in concert with DNR to provide grant funding available to community governmental entities, volunteer organizations, and service organizations involved with local urban and community forest services. The DNR and the USDA Forest Service have a long history of working together to advance shared priorities.

The DNR will:

- create the grant application for communities and counties to apply for the grant money, which will include Federal stipulations.
- create a grant agreement for awarded communities and counties to help meet requirements.
- provide the Forest Service with biannual grant reports.
- make final approval on completion of the grant that all agreements/requirements are met for final reimbursement.

6. Chapter 35 - Fish Habitat Promotion for County Conservation Board Grant Recommendations

The Commission is requested to approve the following grant recommendations pursuant to Chapter 35, Fish Habitat Promotion for County Conservation Board Grants.

Grant Purpose: All revenue derived from fish habitat fees, paid for as part of fishing licenses, is deposited in the state fish and game protection fund to be used for fish habitat development. At least fifty percent of all revenue from the sale of fish habitat fees is distributed equally among the six county conservation board districts. Each district is allowed to hold a two-year apportionment before money is redistributed equally among all districts. Applicants must provide at least 10% cost share for their project. This program is managed by the counties and is open to all county conservation boards for habitat development and acquisition purposes. The DNR serves in an advisory role and oversees funding administration.

Funding Source(s): Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund.

Grant Funding Available: Grants are reviewed by the Counties annually. Funding available for this grant cycle is \$72,149 for each of the six county districts plus any carry over from the previous year for eligible project proposals. Recommended funding is based on state dollars requested.

Summary of Selection Process: The Fish Habitat Grant Review Committees met in December 2024 and January 2025 to rank and score the county conservation board projects in their district.

Selection Committee Members: The review and selection committee for each district consisted of at least five County Conservation Board Director designees and one DNR Fisheries Biologist advisor.

7. Contract with Wildlife Management Institute, Inc. (WMI)

Commission approval is requested for a contract with Wildlife Management Institute, Inc (WMI) of Cabot, Vermont.

Contract Terms

Amount: Not to exceed \$1,400,000

Dates: March 1, 2025 to February 28, 2028

Funding Source(s): external funding (e.g., U.S. Army Corp of Engineers) or other DNR funding (e.g., Lake Restoration

Program).

Contract Purpose: The purpose in entering into this Contract is for the DNR to provide funding for WMI to hire and employ up to 6 Fisheries Specialists for a period of up to three years.

The DNR Fisheries Bureau has a long history of providing high quality fishing opportunities for Iowa anglers. The Bureau normally manages the waters of the state with a combination of permanent employees and seasonal workers in the Management, Research, and Culture sections. Occasionally, the Fisheries Bureau has a need to increase staffing capacity to address a specific, short-term need or to implement a project. This contract with WMI will help the Bureau address these high priority needs when external or other DNR funding is available.

WMI is an organization that works in conjunction with DNR to provide administrative support and facilitate and promote conservation and professional management of wildlife. The DNR and WMI have a long history of working together to advance shared priorities. One of WMI's primary goals for 2025-2030 is to provide novel business solutions to wildlife management partners' business processes and administrative challenges. WMI's purpose in entering into this Contract is to help achieve joint goals and objectives with DNR by employing up to 6 Fisheries Specialists.

The DNR will:

- Identify and provide the funding for the Fisheries Specialists and will coordinate with WMI on the work performed by these individuals.
- Create priorities for each Fisheries Specialist and monitor day-to-day work.
- Provide the Fisheries Bureau structure within which the Fisheries Specialist(s) shall work.
- Provide vehicles, computers, communication and training to each of the Fisheries Specialists.

Selection Process Summary: The Department solicited proposals from targeted small businesses and also published a request of proposals (RFP) on the Department of Administrative Services website.

Criteria Reviewed: Criteria reviewed for this work included the ability to provide the services required to employ up to 6 Fisheries Specialists in partnership with the DNR.

8. Chapter 23 - Wildlife Habitat Promotion with Local Entities Program Grant Recommendations

The Commission is requested to approve the following grant recommendations pursuant to 571 IAC Chapter 23, Wildlife Habitat Promotion with Local Entities Program Grants.

Grant Purpose: In 1979, the lowa General Assembly passed legislation requiring hunters and trappers to purchase a wildlife habitat stamp. All revenue derived from the sale of habitat stamps are used within the state of lowa for acquisition of land, leasing of land, obtaining easements from willing sellers for use as wildlife habitats, and for the development and enhancement of wildlife lands and habitat areas. Beginning in 2019, in accordance with lowa Code 483A.3, a portion of the revenues resulting from the increase in wildlife stamp fees are restricted from use on land acquisition projects. Grant applicants must provide at least 25% cost share for all projects. By lowa Code, grant applications are reviewed twice a year.

Funding Source(s): Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund

Grant Funding Available: \$547,482 (\$182,482 restricted)

Summary of Selection Process: As directed by criteria under 571 IAC Chapter 23, the grant review and selection committee met 1/23/2024 to evaluate and score applications and provide recommendations for the grant awards.

Selection Committee Members: The review and selection committee consists of five members:

DNR Staff (1)

Number of Applications Received: 5 (3 additions to existing/new Wildlife Areas and 2 Habitat Development projects) Recommendations: The committee recommends offering full funding to the Kossuth County Wildlife Area with the remaining \$156,791 being offered to Wright County Wildlife Area. Additionally, the committee recommends offering full funding to the Jefferson County Habitat Development project. The minimum score for eligible projects is 45, so the habitat development project in Clayton County was not eligible to be funded. Any unused funds will carry forward for use in future projects.

Contract Purpose:

The lowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) requires professional services to provide a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Programmatic Environmental Assessment (PEA) to analyze the potential impacts to the human environment that may result from the approval of the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) Agreement. 

13.3 Red Rock Wildlife Management Unit (WMU) Road Maintenance – Warren, Polk and Marion Counties



Recommendation:

Commission approval is requested for a service contract with Iowa State University (ISU), of Ames, Iowa.

Contract Terms:

Amount: Not to exceed \$30,791

Dates: March 13, 2025 to December 31, 2025

Funding Source(s): Federal US Fish and Wildlife Service Grant

<u>Contract Purpose</u>: This contract will provide training and coordination of community scientists conducting acoustic surveys for bats, provide supplies and materials needed to conduct the monitoring, and analyze acoustic data collected by community scientists. Under the competitive grant award agreement, ISU will submit the data collected to the DNR and the federal database for use in long-term monitoring of bats. ISU tasks include:

- Purchase Supplies for Acoustic Monitoring: On behalf of DNR, ISU will purchase all the supplies necessary for monitoring. Monitoring units purchased for this project will become the property of the DNR.
- Training and Monitoring Coordination: ISU will train and coordinate community scientist volunteers
 recruited by DNR to conduct acoustic data collection at 58 sites. Following the conclusion of the training
 process, ISU will continue to coordinate trained volunteers conducting acoustic data collection, and ISU will
 ensure that the data collection occurs as scheduled and follows standard protocols.
- Establish Monitoring Locations within Priority Grids: ISU will locate and ground-truth new mobile routes and fixed-point locations in priority grids in northwest Iowa for monitoring.
- Data Analysis and Submission: ISU will analyze data collected by the volunteers to quantify bat activity, identify bat species, and determine differences in relative species abundance across the regions monitored.
 Data will be submitted to DNR and to the federal database.

The DNR's Wildlife Bureau, under its current Volunteer Wildlife Monitoring Program, will secure the community scientist volunteers for ISU training and coordination; 35-40 volunteers are anticipated to complete this work.

Acoustic bat call data has been collected annually since 2013 and is being used to assess trends in bat activity over time. This project is part of an ongoing national effort to monitor bat populations. ISU was selected because of its expertise in acoustic bat call data analysis and successful completion of similar work with DNR.

Contractor Selection Process:

Intergovernmental contracting with Iowa State University is authorized under 11 IAC 118.4.

Eligible applicants include any local divisions of lowa government. Although Code does not require cost-share for Development projects, it is strongly encouraged. This grant cycle advertised a 20% minimum cost-share from the applicant. As outlined in rule, grants are issued at least annually if funding is available. The last grant cycle was approved in February 2024.

Contract Terms

Amount: Not to exceed \$44,750.00

Dates: February 14, 2025 to November 30, 2031.

Funding Source(s): 33% VPA-HIP Funding, 67% Wildlife Habitat Stamp Fees

Contract Purpose: This 6 year contract with Lundquist Living Trust will allow for the completion of the land management activities described in the Wildlife Management Plan.

Property Description: The Lundquist Living Trust property is 307 acres located in Union County comprised of prairie and woodland habitat. The property is a re-enrollment. The property is under an Iowa Habitat Access Program (IHAP) agreement and will be open to public access for hunting from September 1, 2025 to May 31, 2032.
